Her business, NW Bloom EcoLogical Landscapes, has been designing and building sustainable gardens and maintaining them organically in the Pacific Northwest for 15 years. Jessi specializes in edibles, ecology, animals, permaculture and making gardens highly functional and beautiful.



Dan Borba – Dan has been making rain barrels since 1999 and when he began to realize the unbelievable amount of water coming off a roof (one inch of rain falling on a 1,200 square foot roof is equal to over 600 gallons of water) he wanted to tell people about it. Since then he's sold over 4,000 rain barrels, mostly in western Washington, and teaches classes on how to assemble, install, and use a rain barrel.
