#5 – Cover Bare Soil

Mulch – fully cover the soil with a layer of not-yet-fully-decomposed organic matter

Areas with	Best mulch types to use (proper depth)	
shrubs, trees	woodchips (3 to 4")	leaves (2 to 3")
ferns, perennials, bulbs	leaves (2 to 3")	coarse compost (1 to 2")
vegetables	straw (1 to 1.5")	coarse compost (1 to 1.5")
