2018 Revision: Overall the Maintenance Plan on the Reservoir will require periodic maintenance in and around Lake Tapps, including, but not limited to:

- Maintenance and repair of the tunnel intake facilities and its associated trash rack facilities (to include building repair, gate repair, installation of a pad for a crane needed for repair and restoration work fencing installation and repair and vegetation control);
- Debris and trash removal;
- Removal of hazardous stumps and downed tree; and
- Removal of unauthorized improvements and materials;
- Boat launch maintenance and repair (mainly vegetation management);
- Various valve, gauge and pipeline facilities around the lake;
- Backflow preventer maintenance and repair including debris, downed tree and stump removal, maintenance of gates and other equipment; and
- Sediment removal from the Flowline.

Overall the Maintenance Plan on the Dikes is to prevent structural deficiencies at the dikes and to keep measurement equipment, such as the weir and piezometer in working order, including:

- Inspect, maintain and repair weirs;
- Inspect, maintain and repair piezometers in and around the Lake Tapps dikes;
- Regular maintenance activities, including removing or preventing growth of large vegetation and repairs to dike surfaces, maintaining signage and ecology block identification of dikes; and
- Maintenance and repairs to dike surfaces, including replacement of retaining block wall / rockery with rockery or quarry spalls.

Water is conveyed from the White River to Lake Tapps Reservoir through a diversion canal consisting of a canal, dikes, pipelines, and settling basins. This manmade system is sometimes referred to collectively as the "Flowline." Approximately every 5 years, accumulated sediments are removed from the Flowline to maintain flow of water from the diversion structure to Lake Tapps and to keep the dikes structurally sound. Since the Flowline is an entirely manmade system, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers

and the Department of Ecology have confirmed that no permits are required for the Flowline sediment removal.

According to the Lake Tapps IAVM Plan, fish composition within the Lake Tapps Reservoir includes common carp, black crappie, cutthroat trout, mountain whitefish, rainbow trout, sculpin, red-side shiner, bluegill, yellow perch, tiger musky, smallmouth bass, rock bass, largescale sucker, and kokanee.

On June 28, 2017, Cascade issued a determination of non-significance (“2017 DNS”) for the Five Year (2017 – 2022) Maintenance and Repair Plan.

The scope of the activities proposed by the Five Year (2018 – 2023) Maintenance and Repair Work Plan are identical to the Five Year (2017 – 2023) Maintenance and Repair Work Plan for which the 2017 DNS was issued.

Assessment of Additional Information and Modifications to Proposal: The scope of the activities proposed by the Five Year (2018 – 2023) Maintenance and Repair Work Plan are identical to the Five Year (2017 – 2023) Maintenance and Repair Work Plan for which the 2017 DNS was issued. SEPA encourages use of addenda to avoid duplication and excess paperwork. The purpose of this Addendum is to add information and analysis of impacts to the original proposal description as noted above.

Based on its review, the lead agency has determined that the additional information related to the modifications and details of the Five Year (2018 – 2023) Maintenance and Repair Work Plan project do not substantially change the analysis of significant impacts and alternatives in the 2017 DNS.



An addendum does not require circulation or a comment period.
